Aiming for a Safe and Secure Town – Traffic Safety Classes, Crime Prevention Classes, and Delinquency Prevention Classes were held.

Mr. Hiroshi Fukuda, Chief of Anamizu Office of Wajima Police Station, and Mr. Tetsuro Yoshida, Assistant Inspector, were invited to conduct "Traffic Safety Class", "Delinquency Prevention Class", and "Crime Prevention Class".

In the traffic safety class, the students watched a video on how to be careful when riding a bicycle and learned the importance of wearing a helmet and traffic rules. Students were able to increase their awareness of safety when going to and from school and going out on a daily basis.

In the Delinquency Prevention Lecture, students considered what kind of behavior constitutes bullying and how it may be against the law, based on specific examples. Students took a serious look at the impact of their words and actions on others.

In the crime prevention class, student representatives learned how to respond when encountering a suspicious person, with demonstrations.
